Crocheted Edgings on Flannel

Crocheted edgings on flannel make beautiful baby blankets and are easy to do. There are three basic steps which can be done in a number of ways.

- A. Create your flannel blanket
- B. Create a foundation row on the edge
- C. Crochet your edging


Figure A. Create your flannel blanket.


- Cut 2 pieces of coordinating flannel to your desired size.
- Place them right sides together and pin to secure.
- Stitch 1/4 inch from raw edge all around, leaving an opening of about 6 inches for turning.
- Clip corners.
- Turn right side out, pushing out corners with a chopstick or similar tool.
- Whipstitch opening closed.
- Top stitch 1/4 inch from edge.

Figure B. Create your foundation row using one of the following methods:

- Using a Skip Stitch Blade, a ruler and a mat, run your rotary cutter around the edge of the blanket between the edge and the top stitching.
- Figure B. Using a darning needle and perle cotton thread, create a blanket stitch around the edge of the blanket.



<u>C. Crochet your edging:</u> There are countless beautiful crochet edging patterns available. Here are just a few to get you started. One you get the hang of it, it's easy to experiment and make up some of your own variations.



Double Crochet Shell Stitch

Rnd 1: With right side facing you, join thread in any corner, Ch 1, sc in same hole, and in each hole around; join with a slip st to the first sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 1. sc in the same st * ch 5, skip the next 4 sc, sc into the next sc, repeat from * around; join with a slip st to the first sc. You may have to adjust the pattern as you approach the first sc.

Rnd 3: Ch 3. 2 dc in same st, sc in next loop, * (7 dc in next sc, sc in next loop), repeat from * around to the beginning shell, 4 dc into the beginning sc; join with a slip st to the first ch 3, finish off.



Picot Stitch

Rnd 1: With right side facing you, join thread in any corner, Ch 1, sc in same hole, and in each hole around; join with a slip st to the first sc, continue with the same color for round 2, or finish off and change colors joining new color in any sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in the same stitch and in each of the next 4 sc, work *picot (ch 3, sc into the top of the last sc), sc into the next 5 sc, repeat from * around; join with a slip st to the first sc, finish off.

You may need to adjust he sc between the picots as you approach the first sc.



Sideways Shell

Rnd 1: With right side facing you, join thread in any corner. Ch 1, sc in same hole, and in each hole around; join with a slip st to the first sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 3, 2 dc in the 2nd ch from hook, skip next 2 sc, hdc in next sc, *ch 3, 2 dc around the hdc, skip next 2 sc, hdc in next sc, repeat from * around; join with a slip st to the top of the beginning ch 3.

You may need to adjust stitches as you approach the beginning ch 3. Finish off.



Loopy Edge

Rnd 1: With right side facing you, join thread in any corner. Ch 1, sc in same hole, and in each hole around; join with a slip st to the first sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in same sc, * ch r, skip 1 sc, sc in next sc, repeat from * around; ch 4, join with a slip st to the first sc, finish off.



Lacy Shell

Rnd 1: With right side facing you, join thread in any corner. Ch 1, sc in same hole, and in each hole around; join with a slip st to the first sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in same sc, * skip 2 sc, in the next sc dc, (ch 1, dc), 4 times, skip 2 sc, sc into the next sc, repeat from * around; join with a slip st to the first sc.

Rnd 3: Ch1, sc in same sc, * sc in the next ch 1 space (ch 3, sc into the ch 1 space) 3 times, sc into the next sc, repeat from * around; join with a slip st to the first sc, finish off.
